I mentioned last month that I have been using WordPress quite a bit now for sites where the client wants to do the updating of their site themselves. It isn't for everyone, and I'm happy to do that for my clients.

This group [AMO+](#) (or American Motors of Ontario, Performance Plus) were printing a newsletter which was costing them quite a bit in printing, postage and they asked for my input in how they could implement a website to replace their newsletter. The group added the requirement for the entire site to be password protected apart from the front page.

They are happy with the results and I'm sorry that you can't see all the lovely content inside, but you have to join the group! However, I thought it was a good example of thinking laterally, and what can be achieved when the client and I work together to achieve a workable solution.

You Tube as a marketing tool

I've mentioned before about using [YouTube](#) to gain traffic on your site, but I recently attended a Webinar that gave some good ideas on practical ways to do it.

- People like video because
 - they don't have to read
 - they find it more engaging and in some cases, easier to understand.
- Don't worry about your video needing a director and big budget. The beauty of YouTube is the spontaneity and the roughness of the videos. Authenticity is more important than a slick video.
- Brainstorm your own video ideas by going to YouTube and typing in your business. For example, if you type in Accounting (not usually considered a profession you'd associate with video), you will find after the word "accounting" the words basics, tutorials, lessons, software.
- Offer "How to" value. **How to... something is the most searched for type of videos.** People can search for

QR Codes

I'm sure you have seen QR codes show up on marketing materials such as movie posters, billboards, flyers, and in the newspaper.



What do you need to use them?

1. A mobile phone with a camera and Internet connection
2. A QR code reader

anything from filling out a tax form to bathing a cat (only for the brave). For the accountant, you could offer something like "How to keep your tax paperwork organized".

- Use humour in your video.
- Use a simple hand held camera or capture software such as [Camtasia](#), that records your computer screen and your voice for lessons that involve a computer.
- Make sure your Title is very descriptive.
- Things that make a video go viral?
 - funny or pet related.
 - outrageous
 - scandalous

Now your video may not be any of those, but if you link it to your site and make it short and instructive, you could still create more traffic to your site.

- If you can anticipate a trend, that is always good. Using our accountant example, say there is a new tax deduction that no one understands, you could make a video with a chart on who is eligible, where on your tax form to claim it, and what paperwork you need.

If you think about it, there is likely an interesting aspect on almost any type of business that you could convert to a video to increase awareness of your business.

Safe Passwords

I've been reading a lot about the creation of safe passwords lately. Not only do we make them too simple, but we base them on stuff that is too personal and is pretty easy for people to guess, let alone a computer. A chart below sets out how long it takes a computer to hack various types of passwords.

	Lower Case (26 letters)	Uppercase, Lower, Digits (62 characters)	Uppercase, Lower, Digits, Punctuation (95 characters)
Length = 5 characters	19 minutes	1 day	8 days
Length = 6 characters	18 hours	65 days	2 years
Length = 7 characters	9 days	11 years	200 years
Length = 8 characters	241 days	692 years	19,000 years
Length = 9 characters	17 years	42,000 years	1.8 million years (STRONG)

You should have a different password for every site you visit. **HOW AM I GOING TO REMEMBER THEM ALL?** I hear you cry. I'm with you, I have trouble with the ones that I do have that are different.

An interesting way to do this is to start with a phrase that you like and will remember. So for example use

Cats have nine lives

Change any words that sound like numbers to that number and

Most smart phones have a QR reader already installed, but for some you need to download the reader and install it yourself. (first check that the reader you have is compatible with your phone)

How does it work?

After you have the reader installed, you fire up the application and snap a picture of the QR code. The software then reads the image and uses a browser to let you surf to the site it represents. If it is a VCF card, it will offer to save the contact information into your address book.

Can I make my own QR code?

Yes, you create your own using a QR code Generator (for example [BeQRious](#)). Then save the image file to use on your flyers or advertising.

Why QR Codes are the next big thing?

1. more than 5 million people had smartphones in 2010, and the number is 53 million in the U.S. And more and more people are using their mobile phones to access the web.
2. They are free to create and to use.
3. They take up very little space in print, but have unlimited capacity for the information that is linked to them.
